Regular Public Meeting

Commissioner Oelkers called the meeting to order at 11:00 a.m.

Ketih Nordlund, Fair Board Member, explained where the canopies where going to be placed around the Fairgrounds.

Action on Montana Fence Invoice for Fairgrounds

A motion was made by Commissioner Toavs to accept the Montana Fence Invoice for the Fairgrounds, seconded by Commissioner Macdonald for discussion. Commissioner Oelkers: "I was not at the meeting, so I would like to know the plan and I have some concerns. In the next year, the National Guard Army is going to be waning to sell us and hopefully give us in some agreement their building so we want to make sure that building is not separate and the fence is not separating this. We don't want to spend \$35,000 on a fence and then have to take it down and move it."

Keith Nordlund, Fair Board Member: "Correct so the fence is chain-link and it is fairly easy to move it around. So we have been talking about this fence for a long time. I believe a few years ago, we had a young girl that disappeared from her parents. Currently the fairgrounds are not secured and we have no way to secure the Fairgrounds. The fence is falling down and this new one is 6 feet tall so this young girl getting lost a couple years ago is our driving force. And in regards to where it will go, the current fence runs at an angle and this fence would square it off. We would loose a little bit of parking area but it would give us more area for our entertainment. We have also had a lot of security issues that we will email you. We recently discovered some more vandalism at the Fairgrounds with people shooting out lights and fireworks in there during the Fourth of July, other issues." Commissioner Oelkers: "What's the fence to the north? Around the Airport? Just a

Commissioner Oelkers: "What's the fence to the north? Around the Airport? Just a straight barbed wire fence?"

Keith Nordlund: "Yes a barbed wire fence."

Commissioner Oelkers: "So you aren't securing anything really."

Keith Nordlund: "It is a lot harder to get into the airport than the Fairgrounds. This fence would also help if we wanted to generate some more revenue with other events, we would actually have a way to close our fences and gates. In our monthly audits, the NPCC Safety person, noted the fence as one of the first things to fix. In regards to a new building, we all agree and understand that we want a new building there. However in regards to a new building, the price of a new building is something that we can accomplish in the next five years. This fence is, not inexpensive because it's \$35,000, but it is a starting point that gives our Fairgrounds a better appearance for those driving by and those wanting to rent it as a venue. The main thing is to secure our facility."

Commissioner Macdonald: "I have one question. Is this the only bid that you guys got?"

Keith Nordlund: "So a few years ago, we went to a couple people and Montan Fence company was the only one that would show up."

Commissioner Macdonald: "How about the fence company that did this fence?" (Sheriff's office Fence done last year)

Discussion was had about the fence company and the name of it. Also about not cementing in the fence in case of the need to move it after acquiring the National Guard building.

Bill Juve:" I just have a question because of myself and competitive bidding before. Is the county going to get into a problem with you having already told the price you are working with to the public. Then you go ask somebody else and they only come in \$10 less."

Commissioner Macdonald: "I say with that we could make a motion to authorize them to spend up to \$35,000 on a fence."

Commissioner Oelkers: "Was this put out for competitive bid?"

Keith Nordlund: "Yes two years ago."

Angela Miller, Fair Director: "Yes we put out for bid two years ago and then I was in contact with the company from Sidney and they were not interested in coming back again for a bid. If I could get contact information for the company from Wolf Point."

Commissioner Oelkers: "Was this advertised fro the public?"

Angela Miller: "No it was not."

Commissioner Oelkers: "Because it is \$35,000 we need to have a bid for it. Right now we need to accept or deny this but to me this is not a legit bid to approve." The motion was denied by all three Commissioners.

A motion was made by Commissioner Toavs to readvertise for the Fence Bid for the Fairgrounds, seconded by Commissioner Macdonald. Passed. Angela Miller will readvertise the bid for the Fence for the Fairgrounds.
